Missing Opportunities to Capture

The power of creating contingencies between naturally-occurring (i.e., “offered”) behaviors and valued outcomes is often overlooked in favor of teaching dogs to respond to commands. “Catching & etching” behaviors is a simple method our students and clients can implement quickly, to good effect.

Wasting Reinforcers

Being a skilled reinforcer is the foundation of effective and humane animal-training. Identifying each learner's varied reinforcers and utilizing them frequently and precisely is essential for creating long-lasting behavior change.

Getting the Sequence Wrong

Sometimes one second can make an enormous difference to the efficacy of a training technique. Therefore it's important to understand how a backwards sequence of events (as perceived by the learner) can waste time and effort and also have unwelcome side-effects.

Confounding Reinforcers & Punishers

Most of us would say that, for our dogs, food and play are attractive while reprimands and leash-corrections are aversive. But we err when we presume that the objects and activities which a dog considers reinforcing (or punishing) are immutably so.

Misunderstanding Schedules of Reinforcement

Few topics in the science of learning are duller than schedules of reinforcement. Yet there are points of confusion that can lead to ineffective training techniques and “stubborn” animals.

Unbalancing Physical & Mental Exercise

I share with my clients a simple formula: the dog's Physical Exercise + the dog's Mental Exercise = Sanity
Zookeepers use this concept to compensate for the fact that some of their animals are constrained from getting the ideal amount of physical exercise. Pet guardians can follow this example.

Overlooking Agency

Agency is the capacity of individuals to act independently & make free choices. It is a key component of mental health and as such it should be integrated into our training programs and behavior-modification plans.

Blaming the Human

Are we as force-free with our clients and our colleagues as we are with the animals in our care? When dealing with disagreeable people, can we apply our core skills of careful observation, non-reactivity, gradual shaping, and timely reinforcement of alternate behaviors?
